Leaf Collection Procedure

Purpose: To provide guidelines to the Membership for collection of leaves.

Procedure Detail:

- 1. Members are encouraged to leave leaves on the ground around the trees as much as possible. These leaves degrade to soil over time, providing much needed nutrients for the trees and groundcover to replace eroded soil.
- 2. Understanding that not all leaves can be left on the ground, the Mt. Gretna Campmeeting (MGCA) will provide the following leaf collection services:
 - a. The MGCA will collect loose leaf piles in the Spring from the second Monday in April until the Monday after Memorial Day and from the 3rd Monday in October until the end of the second weekend in December. Leaves will be collected from all driving streets every other week in rotation according to the published schedule. A current year's map and schedule will be posted on the Campmeeting website, published in the Newsletter, and available from the office upon request.NOTE: Leaf piles and leaf bags must contain leaves, pine needles and pine cones only, **no sticks or other debris**.
 - b. Members are always welcome and encouraged to take their leaves to the storage location behind the garages on the east side of 1st Street. These leaves do not need to be bagged. Members may also bag their leaves in paper bags or compostable bags for collection year-round. These bags will not be provided by the MGCA.

Matthews Avenue Native Permaculture Berms Year 2 of 3 Update By Jay Noble

I have experience restoring stream banks, flood plains, installing stream crossings, and other farm-related runoff issues. I was asked to review stormwater problems in 2021 and subsequently donated my time to the Matthews Avenue project.

The problem has been that water from the north properties of Matthews Avenue would rush down the old alleyway and then flow downhill without interruption. This caused erosion problems and added stress to the water flowing down Mills Avenue.

I evaluated these areas and my goal was to slow the water down and drive it into the ground using native plants. This would help to avoid rushing water along impervious surfaces into waterways when possible. Best case scenario would result in rainwater entering the ground and soaking into the stream while not running across surfaces into streams.

I designed and installed a solution in Fall 2021:

- I installed a sequence of scalloped check dams that slow water down by holding it and driving it into the ground while directing any remaining overflow water into vegetated areas downhill between cottages instead of along walkways. Reports from Members are that the rushing stream of water that used to flow along the long downhill path has substantially decreased.
- It will improve over time as the vegetation matures in the berm area. I planted a succession seed mix of approximately 20 plants. This means that fast-growing plants that establish themselves in the short term are overtaken by slow-growing plants. Some plants grow while some plants do not grow depending on the condition of the site. The mix is engineered to establish only those plants suited to site/soil.
- 2022 Succession 1
 - Cover crop of winter rye died off during the summer. This was intentional by design.
- 2023 Succession 2
 - Native grasses, legumes, and other plants follow the winter rye while slowergrowing shrubs take shelter. Thus the reason we ask that this area be free from foot traffic.
- 2024 Succession 3
 - o Native shrubs should start to rise to compete with the plants and grasses.

As of today's date, the site appears to be doing fine. But, one never knows what Mother Nature might have in store. I will continue to keep an eye on it.

It was disappointing to see that someone appeared to have cut out two or three mature, decades-old trees along the installation. The goal is to have mature woody shrubs and trees.

Mount Gretna does not have the luxury of new home developments with large water retention areas. Campmeeting should consider an equivalent by using many small retention solutions. I had hoped to do more but have not had the time.

Everything that I installed seems to be doing the job as expected and has helped drive hundreds of gallons of water into the ground where it belongs already. Permaculture requires patience and knowledge.

Water Tower Replacement Project

The foundation and supporting structure has been completed. The contractor is projecting the erection of the tank to take three to four weeks. Afterward, associated piping and electrical components will be installed and tested, the tank will be painted inside and out; the tank will be disinfected and tested by DEP. Then, the tank will be filled and put in service. The contractor assures us that all equipment and materials needed will not be delayed and will not affect the schedule. The project remains on target. We thank you for your water conservation efforts during this time when we are purchasing water from the Mt. Gretna Authority.




