Water Tower Progress

We are pleased to provide an update on the ongoing progress of the historic Campmeeting Water Tower Replacement Project. We invite you to review the three videos submitted by Ben Slotznick, which offer a visual glimpse into the recent developments.

The first video, a 20-minute version, provides a comprehensive overview of the crane set-up and post-lifting crane "take-down" processes. To condense the footage, these sections have been sped up and muted. However, the ten minutes of actual lifting have been presented in mostly real-time, allowing us to witness this crucial phase of the construction. The video showcases the meticulous planning and execution involved in safely lifting the heavy components of the new water tower.

The second video, a 10-minute version, focuses solely on the ten minutes of actual lifting mentioned above. This footage allows you to observe the precision and coordination required as the crane operators delicately maneuver the sections into place. It provides a close-up view of the construction crew's expertise and highlights the progress made in erecting the new water tower.

For a quick overview, the third video is a one-minute version that condenses the ten minutes of actual lifting into a high-speed sequence. This video, sped up ten times faster than real time, provides a dynamic visual representation of the lifting process. While it does not offer the same level of detail as the previous two videos, it conveys the magnitude and complexity of the operation in a concise format.

Throughout these videos, it is evident that the project is advancing steadily. The

construction team's proficiency and attention to detail are apparent, ensuring the safe and efficient replacement of the water tower.

We extend our gratitude to Ben for capturing and sharing these videos, which provide valuable insights into the construction process. The videos are available for viewing, and we encourage everyone to take a moment to witness the ongoing transformation of the historic Campmeeting water tower.

Seeking Time-Traveling Scribes: Uncover the Secrets of Our Handwritten Archives








Braiding Sweetgrass,







Tabernacle Update

Over the course of the past nearly year and a half, an intensive effort has been underway to raise funds for the renovation, upkeep, and maintenance of the Tabernacle. The remarkable generosity of the Campmeeting community, donations from Bible Festival attendees and others, along with the work of the Tabernacle Association and the Advancement Committee of the MGCA Board of Managers has truly made the difference in successfully finishing a number of important projects.

To date, the Violette Cassel Room has been completely renovated thanks to the Engle Family, the bell tower has been repaired thanks to Joy and Bill Linton, the stage has been painted and its foundation strengthened, improved storage made available underneath the building, and the bathrooms have been given a much-needed face-lift thanks to generous donations from the Bible Festival and the Building Fund of the Tabernacle Association. Maintaining this sacred and historic space is demanding and expensive, but one thing everyone agrees must be ongoing.

Throughout the spring, many people may have noticed the scaffolding in the interior of the Tabernacle. Workmen strengthened and upgraded the "tension ring" which keeps the roof together and gives the structure the ability "to breathe" and expand and contract with the changes in weather and humidity. For a building open to the weather year-round, used heavily in the summer, and long past its centennial birthday, this work was vital. Happily, the work is being covered by a \$10,000 grant from the Lebanon County Hotel Tax, a very generous \$10,000 grant from the Mt. Gretna United Methodist Church William Drendell Endowment Fund, as well as financial support from the Building Fund of the Tabernacle Association.

The "legwork" to complete and submit grant applications for the "tension ring" project was provided by Advancement Committee members like Pat Brosious and Andrea George. Ongoing awareness of necessary building projects comes from Buildings and Grounds Committee chair, Miles Bojanic, and Bible Festival chair, Bob Kettering. This collaborative effort makes sure uses and needs are combined and heard together, and thus requests are made that address real problems and challenges. All of this together with the financial support from the community, is helping to keep the Tabernacle healthy and alive for decades to come.

Finally, your generosity always matters. When you donate during a service or a show, please make sure you designate the "Building Fund" of the Tabernacle Association if you are so inclined. Your money will be turned right back around to support the building, and there's few finer things you can do for Campmeeting. We all seem to remember the ruffed grouse and mountain laurel as symbols of Pennsylvania, but did you know we have a state insect? As of 1974, the Pennsylvania firefly, or as entomologists like to call it, Photuris pensylvanica, has been the official insect representative of our state. So commonplace that it is easily dismissed, this beetle has got it all. A life cycle of amazing metamorphosis, beautiful bioluminescence ...and even a bit of murder. The females mimic the flashing of the males of other species in order to bait them in and eat them! In addition to all the drama, their larvae eat slugs, snails and also invasive species, and keep these populations in check.

They are a gem of a neighbor, cause no disease transfer or harm to humans, and are a vital part of our local food web. Take an evening stroll through our community gardens to enjoy their annual display, and remember to let some of your fall leaves lay for the benefit of their larvae.
