

Message from the Mount Gretna Tabernacle Association By Ted Martin

In early fall 2023, I wrote a letter to Camp Meeting residents and Bible Festival supporters and Tabernacle event attendees alerting everyone to a leaky building roof that was only growing more serious by the month. The health of a building we all love was being threatened by its constant vigilance in weather of all sorts, and careful inspection determined that the best course of action was a new roof for the Tabernacle.

It was a daunting and costly prospect when we did the math and determined that the centerpiece of our community was facing an unforeseen project at an **expected cost of approximately \$50,000**. The good news in this effort was that the Tabernacle Association Building Fund already had approximately half of the \$50,000 needed for these repairs and the Campmeeting Association agreed to share costs in the work. Everyone was determined that this work be completed by the opening of the 2024 Season in early summer.

So, we sent out a mailer and asked everyone to be generous with a financial contribution, and then we waited.

We didn't have a long wait.

Within weeks, your incredible generosity shone through, and contributions literally poured in at an unbelievable rate. Topping it all off was an incredibly generous grant of \$25,000 from West Cornwall Township.

And so, I am very pleased to report that as it currently stands, we have raised approximately \$95,000 in our effort to replace the Tabernacle roof.

That's right, approximately \$95,000!

Thanks to you, we are now in the process of lining-up roofing work for the early spring. Also, thanks to you, we can consider other possible projects for the Tabernacle ranging from

improved lighting, air circulation, and paving. It's also important to maintain a healthy balance in the Tabernacle Association Building Fund for future challenges, and that's now possible too. It's a remarkably good situation we find ourselves in, and you made it happen.

To all those who have given, I am grateful. The Tabernacle will be healthier and stronger because of you. But of equal importance, in a day and age when it is fashionable to say Americans can no longer work together on anything and that things are so dark, this provides a resounding response of "nonsense". I would hazard a guess to say that the people who love and use the Tabernacle have many different opinions of the world. However, when an emergency need arose, everyone joined together, asked no questions, and followed through with great generosity. And at a time of much division, on that score we all should be proud.

Frosty Foundations: Navigating Snow and Ice in Campmeeting

As we embrace winter in Campmeeting, we want to assure you that MGCA Superintendent Nate Godfrey and his dedicated team are actively working to ensure the safety of our community members.

Winter weather brings its own set of challenges. No snowfall/storm/blizzard is like any other. When we know that snow is looming on the horizon, there are several factors that we evaluate (including but not limited to):

- At what time will the winter weather event begin?
- At what time will the winter weather event end?
- What is the total accumulation, and how does that impact equipment used?
- How do the above considerations impact morning commuters?
- What are the outside temperatures before, during, and after the winter weather event?
- Will snowfall be preceded or followed by freezing rain, icy mix, etc.?
- How have similar weather events been handled in the past and what adjustments or improvements do we need to make?
- What paths and streets (that MGCA staff clears) will be prioritized?
- When is the Borough commencing pre-treatment and clearing of our streets and parking lots?
- Collaboration of various sources of weather projections, in order to be prepared for the most likely weather times and patterns.
- At what time(s) will we plan to begin clearing snow and ice? How many of our staff are available, and what is the plan?

After considering factors such as those listed above, MGCA staff prepare for winter Campmeeting street treatments (including but not limited to):

- Evaluate the weather and the most likely course of action.
- Create a tentative plan and role duties for staff
- Stage relevant snow clearing equipment at the Tabernacle.
- Fuel and start all engines to ensure readiness.
- Ensure salt is staged and ready to be deployed.
- Please note that salt is not effective when the temperature drops below 25 degrees.
- Pretreat roads and paths with salt, if necessary.
- Adjust the plan if necessary.

DURING the winter weather event, MGCA staff execute their strategies (including but not limited to):

- Begin clearing roads and paths (that MGCA is responsible for) according to a 3-tiered prioritization approach.
 - Tier 1 Walkways and roads that are commonly driven or utilized by residents, especially those that do not have direct access to a borough cleared street.
 - Tier 2 Less used walkways and roads, with cottages that do not have full-time residents and/or otherwise have direct access to a borough cleared street.
 - o Tier 3 Walkways that are low priority for access and use, and are used infrequently in the winter.
- The team is divided into roles: Toro plow operator, snow plow operators, and shovelers.
- Commence spreading salt depending on the temperature and efficacy of those measures.
- Re-evaluate weather and measures taken. Adjust the plan accordingly.

AFTER a winter weather event, MGCA staff execute additional strategies (including but not limited to):

- Commence (or repeat) snow/ice clearing and salting, if necessary.
- Clean up areas that were not cleared well, or need to be widened, etc.
- Ongoing maintenance of walkways and roads

The Carter and Kauffman parking lots, vital areas for our community, are plowed by the Mt. Gretna Borough. This ensures that residents have access to parking spaces even during snowy conditions. Snow plowing gravel parking lots presents unique challenges due to the nature of gravel surfaces. Unlike paved lots, gravel lots have uneven surfaces with loose materials that can be displaced by plowing equipment. This displacement often leads to the unintentional removal of gravel along with snow, resulting in potential damage to the lot's surface. Additionally, gravel lots are prone to forming uneven snow banks and drifts, making it challenging to achieve consistent and thorough snow removal. The loose nature of gravel can also hinder the traction of snow plows, impacting their effectiveness. Balancing the need to clear snow for safety with the preservation of the gravel surface requires a delicate approach to avoid unnecessary wear and tear. Overall, snow plowing gravel parking lots demands specialized techniques and careful consideration to maintain both safety and the integrity of the lot.
