

Dumpster Rules Reminder

The MGCA dumpsters are a popular option for trash disposal. The vast majority of community members use them properly, but reminders are a good thing.

- MGCA dumpsters are for use by MGCA Members, guests, and tenants for disposal of regular, Campmeeting **household** waste only.
- Household Waste must be bagged (maximum 35-gallon bags), and all waste must be placed <u>inside</u> the dumpsters, <u>not beside</u> them!
- Dumpster truck operators will not pick up items left beside the dumpsters. Placing items in the vicinity of the dumpsters (rather than in them) is considered "illegal littering on private property".
- Construction materials are NOT household waste and are considered "illegal dumping" and subject to fines and/or prosecution. Members must make arrangements to have construction and spring/garage cleanout type items disposed of.
- Disposal of cardboard is permitted **if boxes are broken down and flattened** and placed **inside** the dumpsters.

Items prohibited for disposal in dumpsters include, but are not limited to: construction/demolition waste, yard/garden waste, medical waste, carpet, flooring, furniture, appliances, electronics, batteries, oils, antifreeze, paints, solvents, propane tanks, and any flammable or hazardous materials.

Members who need to dispose of large items must make arrangements with the trash hauler and must pay an additional fee directly to the trash hauler. Contact TNT Sanitation at 717-866-2322, or www.tntsanitation.com.

If everyone abides by the rules the dumpster area will remain clean and safe and dumpster capacity will be sufficient for the intended purpose. For questions about curbside trash pick-up, recycling or dumpster-usage, please email office@mtgretnacampmeeting.org or call 717-964-3040.

May is a glorious month for plants as they begin their yearly cycle of growth, the perennials in our Community Garden are emerging and getting taller each day.

Creating an ecologically friendly landscape is particularly important. Our landscape is part of a broader landscape mosaic. By incorporating native plants in the Community Garden, we will have a positive impact on nature and the environment, minimize water usage, and fertilizer. Native perennials of various heights, sizes, and colors will attract and support birds, pollinators, and other living things by providing food and habitat.

A diverse variety of plant material is in the Community Garden. Each year more varieties are added for our residents to enjoy by observing their growth and the species that are attracted to the different plants.

Enriching Campmeeting Parks with Meaningful Fixtures

The Campmeeting Memorial Program includes a variety of fixtures that enhance our community parks - picnic tables, 3-seater benches, 2-seater benches, and Adirondack chairs in select areas within the Campmeeting.

Over time, some of the benches and picnic tables in our parks have experienced wear and tear, diminishing their functionality and appeal. Additionally, factors like location and maintenance issues have led to some fixtures being underutilized or in poor condition.

To address this, our Buildings & Grounds team is working to replace these items strategically, focusing on both durability and usability. As part of a trial effort, we're introducing Adirondack chairs to Memorial Park and Dogwood Park, as they offer enhanced comfort for extended sitting periods.

While placement location cannot be guaranteed, community members interested in sponsoring a purchase

will have the opportunity to have a memorial plaque affixed to the fixture. This sponsorship allows individuals to have input on the preferred location for the fixture, though final placement decisions will be made with community needs in mind.

The current prices for the available items, including the cost of a memorial plaque:

- Memorial Bench, 3-seater (72" long) \$650
- Memorial Bench, 2-seater (48" long) \$500
- Memorial Chair, Adirondack Style \$170

Please note that while picnic tables are not currently included in the "Memorial" category due to longevity concerns, they are still being considered for replacement and strategic placement.

Flame Awareness

With spring in full bloom, the air is filled not only with the fragrance of flowers and trees but also with the enticing aroma of hamburgers sizzling on grills and marshmallows toasting over fire pits. As we eagerly anticipate spending time outdoors, it is important to remember to be mindful of open flames in the Campmeeting area.

Please note that charcoal or gas grills, along with any other open-flame cooking devices, are prohibited from use on combustible covered porches. However, while fire rings, fire pits (permanent or portable), and deck/patio heaters are permitted, it's important to ensure that these devices have a properly fitting spark screen cover over the open flame. Additionally, they should not be operated on porches for safety reasons.

Before setting up a fire pit, take a moment to survey your surroundings. Ensure there are no trees or foliage nearby that could catch fire from sparks. Remember, fire safety is everyone's responsibility.

Special Meeting on Proposed Charter & Bylaws Revisions - May 21, 2024

A Special Meeting of the Members of the Mt. Gretna Campmeeting Association will be held on May 21st, 2024, for the purpose of voting on the proposed revisions to the Charter & Bylaws. This is the only business that will be discussed at the Special Meeting.

The Board conducted the first reading of the proposed changes to the MGCA Charter & Bylaws at its regular March meeting.

A second reading of the revised Charter & Bylaws occurred at the regular Board Meeting on April 16.

In accordance with the current "Charter & By-Laws" of the Mount Gretna Campmeeting Association, a vote of the Membership to accept the proposed changes will be held at a Special Meeting:

- 1. **Date and Time:** May 21, 2024, at 6:30 p.m. The Special Meeting will be held before the regular monthly Board Meeting.
- 2. **Quorum:** A quorum, or 10% of the Membership households, must be present.
- 3. **Passing Vote:** Two-thirds of the Members present at the Special Meeting must vote in favor of the changes to the Charter & Bylaws for the motion to pass. (Reminder: One vote per household, or where multiple properties are owned by the same group of owners there is one vote per household group.)
- 4. **Place of Meeting:** The Special Meeting will be held via Zoom only.
- 5. **Zoom Registration Deadline:** All Members wishing to attend the Special Meeting must register for the meeting by May 21st at 6 a.m. The link to register for the Special Meeting is below. One registration per voting household will be approved.
- 6. **Method of Vote**: Voting procedures will be shared with Members in the coming weeks.

A reminder of this Special Meeting will be sent to the Membership on a biweekly basis through May.

Upcoming Holidays Impacting TNT Trash Pick-Up

In observance of Memorial Day, trash and recycling collection will <u>not</u> take place on Monday, May 27, 2024. **Trash and recycling will be picked up on Tuesday, May 28, 2024**. Reminders about holidays and trash pick-up will be posted on the Mt. Gretna Neighborhood Association Facebook page and sent to Members via email by the MGCA Office.

What You Need to Know About Spring Leaf and Stick Collection

Regular leaf collection will resume later this month, continue until early June, then start again in the fall. Spring collection will be similar to collection procedures executed in the fall, and more details will be communicated soon.

Collection of sticks and other "green waste," (sticks, branches, pine cones, root balls from potted plants, etc.) resumed in April but will continue periodically throughout the summer months.

- Leaf piles may contain leaves, pine cones and pine needles ONLY!
- Sticks and green waste MUST be placed in a separate pile—not in the leaf pile!
- Both piles must be free of pet waste and foreign objects.
- Piles that do not meet these requirements will NOT be collected.
