MGCA Members Approve Bylaw Changes at Special Meeting

At a Special Meeting of the Mount Gretna Campmeeting Association held on May 21, Members voted to approve the proposed changes to the MGCA Bylaws. A total of 119 Members voted at the Special Meeting – 86 Members voted in support of the proposed changes, 33 Members voted not to support the changes. A ½ majority of Members attending the Special Meeting, or 80 votes, was required for approval of the changes.

The Board of Managers understands that the revised Bylaws changes will necessitate some policy changes, and we are working on that language. So, the next time you're at the grocery, Costco or Wal-Mart, pick up an extra cellophane-wrapped package of 24, 36, or more(!) bottles of water for the Fire Company. Packs of water can be left at the door to the rear of the building by the crew parking area if no one is there.

Spring Leaf Pickup Ending

As a reminder, the spring leaf pickup has concluded and won't begin again until autumn. This spring, we often had the problem of what you might call "pile integrity". Piles of leaves often included stone/rock, decomposing hummus (leaves, dirt, etc.), and sticks. If you are using a contractor to gather leaves on your property, it is important that they understand that only leaves and pine cones can be in the leaf pile. Ultimately it is the responsibility of the homeowner to ensure that piles put out for MGCA pickup comply with our posted standards. Leaves in one pile...sticks in another. Our machine gets clogged constantly, or damaged when anything else but leaves and pinecones are present. Stick pickup continues throughout the year.

8th Street Reversal

The Building and Grounds Committee has been monitoring and thinking about ways to mitigate the unsafe exit from the one-way 8th Street onto Route 117. When cars are parked along 117, a safe entry onto 117 from 8th street is nearly impossible because of the lack of visibility. After evaluating this problem and possible solutions, we have decided on a course of action. **Beginning, Wednesday, June 5, 8th Street's one-way direction will be reversed.** Instead of the flow of traffic being from South to North (Boehm to 117), it will be one-way from North to South (117 to Boehm). This will result in no loss of parking along 117, while providing safe entry from 117 onto 8th street.

Dumpster Reminders

Please familiarize yourself with the dumpster rules. As the summer season begins, and people are returning, we are once again seeing items being thrown in the dumpster that are prohibited. Only Campmeeting residents and renters of a Campmeeting cottage are authorized to dispose of trash in our dumpsters. Please help us police and regulate this, so we can continue to have this service available to us.

Tabernacle Receives Spring Cleaning

This past spring, the Tabernacle received a new roof, thanks to the generosity of many community members. On May 18, a much-needed "Spring Cleaning" took place. A heartfelt thank you to Kay and Tom Heberling for organizing the event. Volunteers cleaned benches, the stage, and windows, picked up sticks around the Tabernacle, and spruced up the Violet Cassel room in preparation for summer. We extend our gratitude to all the volunteers for their invaluable gift of time and energy, which the community deeply appreciates.

Matthews Avenue Permaculture Project Update

In the third and final year of the Matthews Avenue permaculture project, significant progress has been made. Under the diligent oversight of Jay Noble, Executive Director of the Mount Gretna School of Art, and with the dedicated efforts of the Art School students, we have reached a crucial phase in the development of this sustainable landscaping initiative.

Project Recap and Progress

The permaculture project, initiated in 2022, focuses on the installation of succession seed mixes, designed to minimize maintenance costs and foster a natural, self-sustaining ecosystem. Here's a summary of the three-year plan:

- Year One (2022): We planted a diverse mix of native seeds along with a winter cover crop. The cover crop rapidly stabilized the soil and conditioned the area, dying back as native grasses and plants began to dominate.
- Year Two (2023): Native grasses and plants established themselves, with slow-growing woody species starting to emerge.
- Year Three (2024): Woody species are now beginning to rise above the native grasses, solidifying the area. These species will mature to form a robust, self-sustaining landscape.

Current Focus

As we progress through this third year, it's critical to protect the area from trampling. The young woody species, still vulnerable, need time to mature. To prevent damage, we recommend keeping the protective fence and signs in place for an additional year.

Future Plans

This fall, Jay will conduct a thorough inventory to identify any gaps in the planting. While nature typically requires minimal intervention, a bit of follow-up ensures the success of our project. Art School students will continue to weed the area during the summer, and occasional walkthroughs will be conducted to clear debris.

The Matthews Avenue permaculture project stands as a testament to the benefits of sustainable landscaping, providing long-term environmental and economic advantages. We look forward to seeing the full establishment of the woody species over the coming months.





Our Community Garden Supports Pollinators...so can you! By Pat Wilmsen

When you think about pollinators, I bet you think about bees. However, birds, moths, butterflies, wasps, and bats are all also pollinators in our area.

Nearly every patch of green space can help sustain pollinators with nectar and pollen to eat. Why not tend a patch yourself? You don't need a large plot of land. If you don't have a backyard, a balcony will do. Just plant a pot of coneflowers or bee balm, both are native to Pennsylvania.

To attract a variety of pollinators, include a selection of plants native to Pennsylvania. To thrive, pollinators need a variety of nectar and pollen sources. Check field guides to find out which plants local caterpillars eat. Search online to find pollinator-friendly plants for your area. Contact your local or state native plant society for help. Your local agricultural extension service is also a good resource. Other resources for native plants include finding your local native plant supplier or a resident horticulturalist to answer questions.

Another way to help our local pollinators is to put up a bee house like the one pictured here. You also can see one in person in the Community Garden.

Providing water for pollinators is also important. Place marbles or rocks in a small dish or cup, then add water. Place the cups/dishes around your yard. The pollinators will be able to stand on these while getting a drink without drowning.



Take a stroll through the Community Garden to see how we are working to support our pollinators. A lot of the plants that may look a little shaggy are actually great pollinators such as the milkweed. In addition, you'll find many other native plants like bee balm, coneflowers, St. John's wort, Joe Pye weed, etc. Enjoy the Community Garden—the birds, the bees and the butterflies certainly do!
