Short-Term Rental Permits

Regarding short-term rental permits, of the 72 short-term rental permits available, as outlined in Rule 20 and the associated policy, <u>42 permits</u> are currently granted in the community.

Short-term rental permit holders are reminded that West Cornwall Township (WCT) has created zoning ordinances regarding short-term rental units. It is your responsibility to comply with WCT permit requirements.

Cottage Resale Certificate

A Resale Certificate is required for all cottage sales/transfers. This ensures that the Bylaws and Rules & Regulations are given to the buyer, and that the buyer agrees that they are reviewed. This removes the risk from the Campmeeting and its volunteers. New Member Orientation meetings will be encouraged but no longer required.

No Fireworks in the Campmeeting

With its closely spaced wooden buildings, fire has always been a great threat and concern in the Campmeeting. And while the use of "consumer-grade" fireworks such as firecrackers, Roman candles, and bottle rockets is legal in PA, their use is subject to restrictions, which include:

- They cannot be ignited or discharged on public or private property without expressed permission of the property owner.
- They cannot be discharged within 150 feet of an occupied structure.

• They cannot be discharged toward a motor vehicle or building.

The MGCA has NOT granted permission for use of fireworks on Campmeeting streets and other Common Property. That combined with the other restrictions effectively preclude their use in our community.

Nature-Themed Programs to Inspire Environmental Stewardship

10 a.m., Monday, July 21 – "Good Bugs, Bad Bugs!" Explore our six-legged neighbors with Dr. Chris Riley, entomologist. Learn about the critters you might encounter in your backyard!

10 a.m., Tuesday, July 22 – "Homegrown National Park" Doug Tallamy speaks on a national challenge to create diverse ecosystems and save critical wildlife in our yards, farms, and surrounding lands by reducing lawn, planting native, and removing invasives. If many people make small changes, TOGETHER we can restore healthy ecological networks and weather the changes ahead.

3 p.m., Tuesday, July 22 – "How Can I Help? How we can save nature in our yards" Based on his latest book, Doug Tallamy addresses as many of the thoughtful questions as he can with hopes that answers will further motivate people to help restore ecosystem function where they live, work, play, worship, and farm.

7 p.m., Tuesday, July 22 – "Critters and Creatures." This Pennsylvania Wildlife program will introduce you to several native birds and reptiles, some of which may be in your own backyard! If the weather is good, we'll be outside, so bring a blanket or a lawn chair.

10 a.m., Thursday, July 24 – "Rachel Carson: Silent Spring." Carson ignited the modern environmental movement with her seminal study of the effects on wildlife of the insecticide DDT. Colleen Webster will connect us with Carson's research and legacy through re-enactment. 7 p.m., Thursday, July 24 – "Soldier's Field Meadow, A Community Ecological Restoration Project." Elyse Jurgen of Waxwing EcoWorks will talk about the process and plants in the ongoing meadow restoration project. The community participation benefits both the ecological and social frameworks of the project.

9-11 a.m., Friday, July 25 – "Bird Walk with Mount Gretna Bird Club." Bring binoculars and meet at the Chautauqua parking lot to identify our feathered friends.

With the exception of the Bird Walk and Tallamy's talk (Playhouse) all other programs will take place in the Hall of Philosophy, 212 Gettysburg Ave., Mount Gretna

Quiet Hours and Quiet Season

Just a gentle reminder to all Members regarding Quiet Hours and Quiet Season which begins on July 15. Rule 17 states:

In the interest of preserving the peace and quiet beauty of The Campmeeting, Quiet Hours shall be maintained all day Sunday, 10 p.m. to 7 a.m. Monday through Thursday, and 11 p.m. to 7 a.m. Friday and Saturday.

Out of respect for residents and the summer programs held in the Tabernacle, special noise abatement rules are in effect July 15 through and including August 31. This is commonly referred to as "Quiet Season." High decibel power tools, such as saws and leaf blowers, and manual work, such as framing and roofing, are prohibited. Moderate noise created by indoor work is acceptable. Painting and landscaping are permitted. During the Quiet Season, permitted work must be confined to the hours between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Monday through Saturday. An exception shall be made for the Superintendent of Grounds.

Respect for neighbors' quiet enjoyment will be considered in enforcement of noise rules regarding Quiet Hours and Quiet Season. With the approval of the Board of Managers, emergency repairs to buildings or service lines are permitted during designated quiet times. MGCA Members must contact the Mt. Gretna Campmeeting Association office to request emergency approvals.
