Short-Term Rental Permits

Regarding short-term rental permits, of the 72 short-term rental permits available, as outlined in Rule 20 and the associated policy, 43 permits are currently granted in the community.

Short-term rental permit holders are reminded that West Cornwall Township (WCT) has created zoning ordinances regarding short-term rental units. It is your responsibility to comply with WCT permit requirements.

Cottage Resale Certificate

A Resale Certificate is required for all cottage sales/transfers. This ensures that the Bylaws and Rules & Regulations are given to the buyer, and that the buyer agrees that they are reviewed. This removes the risk from the Campmeeting and its volunteers. New Member Orientation meetings will be encouraged but no longer required.

Personal Path to Gretna

Melissa Kreider's story is one of deep roots and intentional choices. She first discovered Mt. Gretna during college when her family would stop at the Jigger Shop on their way to a cabin in Adams County. With a grandfather from Lebanon and a great-grandfather who worked as a barber on Cumberland Street, Melissa has always felt connected to the area.

After living in Washington State and Massachusetts, Melissa was drawn back east. "I love intentional communities," she explains. "The personality of Gretna, its art, its history — it's a place where I find peace in nature and creativity."

Life in the Campmeeting

For Melissa, the Campmeeting is the perfect fit. As a single person, she values the intimacy of the cottages and the daily connections with neighbors. Her century-old home reflects the history she cherishes, while community treasures like the Tabernacle, Little Free Library, murals, and gardens bring daily joy.

"People often call it magical. It's a hideaway — a Shangri-La in Lebanon County."

Cherished Memories & Traditions

Melissa recalls renting a house near the Playhouse during college, as her family weighed the decision of whether to buy in Gretna or Adams County. Though her family chose Adams County then, Gretna's charm never left her heart. She now treasures:

- Volunteering as an usher for Gretna Music and Gretna Theatre
- Enjoying the Art Show and its growing focus on sustainability
- Attending bluegrass concerts, sing-alongs, and impromptu gatherings
- Continuing summer traditions like the Memorial Day Porch Sale

She is especially fascinated by Gretna's railroad history, imagining the days when tourists rode the narrow-gauge line to Governor Dick.

The Spirit of Community

What stands out to Melissa is the way Gretna weaves together history, creativity, and hospitality. Whether it's stumbling into a neighbor's baby shower, joining a sing-along, or greeting visitors at the Porch Sale, Gretna feels alive with kindness and artistry.

Looking Ahead

Melissa dreams of Gretna remaining historic and forward-thinking — with thriving arts, sustainable practices, and strong intergenerational ties. "I want people who come here to feel renewed by nature, inspired by creativity, and energized by the small touches of care," she says.

Melissa's Mt. Gretna in a Nutshell:


- A walk through Governor Dick, a stop at Porch & Pantry, and a ride on the Rail Trail.

Flame Awareness

As evenings grow cooler, and thoughts turn to convivial evenings around a fire pit, it is important to be mindful of the danger of open flames in the Campmeeting area.

Obviously, the use of charcoal or gas grills, along with any other open-flame cooking devices, are prohibited from use on combustible covered porches. However, fire rings, fire pits (permanent or portable), and deck/patio heaters are permitted. It's important to ensure that these devices have a properly fitting spark screen cover over the open flame. Additionally, they should not be operated on porches for safety reasons.

Before setting up a fire pit, take a moment to survey your surroundings. Ensure there are no trees or foliage nearby that could catch fire from sparks. Remember, fire safety is everyone's responsibility.

Leaf Collection Procedure

It wouldn't be autumn in Mt. Gretna without the leaves! Members are reminded that leaves, pine needles, and pine cones must be separated from sticks, in accordance with the Leaf Collection Procedure. Any piles containing mulch, stones, sticks, etc. will not be collected.

Please review the Leaf Collection Procedure, Leaf Removal Street Map, and the 2025 Leaf Collection Schedule (below). Leaf collection will begin the week of October 20 and will end the week of December 8.



Mt. Gretna Campmeeting Association Leaf Collection Procedure

Purpose: To provide guidelines to the Membership for collection of leaves Procedure Detail:

- 1. Members are encouraged to leave leaves on the ground around the trees as much as possible. These leaves degrade to soil over time, providing much needed nutrients for the trees and groundcover to replace eroded soil.
- Understanding that not all leaves can be left on the ground, the Mt. Gretna Campmeeting (MGCA) will provide the following leaf collection services:


 a. The MGCA will collect loose leaf piles in the Spring that are <u>placed on the street</u> from
 - the second Monday in April through the weekend after Memorial Day and piles <u>placed</u> on the street from the 3rd Monday in October until the end of the second weekend in December, Leaves will be collected from the indicated driving streets every other week in rotation according to the published schedule. A current year's map and sched be posted on the Campmeeting website, published in the Newsletter, and available from the office upon request. NOTE: Leaf piles must contain leaves, pine needles and pine cones only, **no sticks or other debris**.
 - Members are always welcome and encouraged to take their leaves to the storage location behind the garages on the east side of 1st Street. These leaves may not be bagged, must be placed in the designated leaf stall, and may not contain anything but leaves, pine needles, and pine cones
